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



- Their first second hand store was located in the former police station in the old Town Hall, complete with jail cells. They were open for 4 hours per week and earned approximately \$100.00 a month profit.
- In 1974 they moved to a 10' x 20' garage and became "Bargain Alley". They rented the building for \$75.00 per month and their shelves were built of wooden milk crates and egg boxes.
- In 1988 they officially became "Repeat Boutique" when they purchased a vacant house as their new location. (currently the home of Community Lunchbox).
- With an increase in business and popularity they moved to their current location in July 1994 and their floor space grew to 6,720 sq. ft.
- Supporting many families of Whitecourt, along with, fire victims, wildfire evacuees, victims of violence, needy individuals and school children in need of clothing.
- Completely volunteer run with 50 volunteers who log up to 1500 hours per month!
- An incredible amount of support for local health care. Including candy stripers, incentives for new doctors considering moving to
 our community, \$125 000.00 towards the Spruceview Lodge and donating over three million dollars worth of equipment to the
 Whitecourt Healthcare Center. Completely funding the
- Offering a \$2500.00 scholarship to applying graduates pursuing a career in the medical field.

Mr. Viersen spent a few minutes sharing with students his background before Parliament. He grew up in the small town of Neerlandia, just outside of Barrhead, Ab and was initially an automotive mechanic before getting into politics. He is now a Member of Parliament for the Peace River-Westlock area, an area that spans as large as Iceland. He is also on the Northern and Aboriginal Affairs Committee, where he

takes part in the discussion of laws before they go into to the House of Commons. He is also a Deputy Critic for Rural Affairs, where discussions take place regarding matters such as farming and public transit. He encouraged students who have an interest in government and a passion for controversy to seriously consider a career in politics. Mr. Viersen continued his presentation by sharing some facts and information about the government of Alberta and the current state of our economy. He then proceeded to take questions from the audience. Students asked a broad range of very well thought out questions regarding his stance on topics such as; Women's Rights, Islamic



Rights, LGBTQ, marijuana legalization, Wynn's Law and assisted suicide. Mr. Viersen spoke openly to students about his stance on each topic and concluded with a generalization of the Conservative Party's view point. His party believes in freedom and equal treatment under the law and they believe in protecting people rather than ideas. Health Care Aide and Dual Credit Opportunity

Northern Gateway Public Schools is now offering an exciting Dual Credit opportunity in Health Care Aide. The program will start in September 2017 and continue until the end of July. The program will be run out of Mayerthorpe, however, it is also available to Hilltop students. The program consists of 7 courses and 17 tests and will run 4 afternoons a week from 12:30 pm – 3:30 pm. Students will do theory via video conference from Hilltop and travel to Mayerthorpe for labs. You must be 16 years or older to do clinical. Students must have at least 70% or higher to pass and will then earn 25 high school credits. Training obtained will not transfer to LPN but will provide you will a valuable understanding of the medical field and important skills to get you started. Only 24 students maximum will be accepted and grade 12 students will have first priority. The program also requires a \$400.00 deposit.

Helpful Hint from the Family Community Liaison Program (FCLP)

One of the most important skills that we can teach our children is empathy. This is the ability to understand and share the feelings of others. Empathy gives us the ability to build close relationships, maintain friendships, and develop strong communities.

Research tells us that kids who engage in meaningful conversations about emotional experiences have higher levels of empathy. Kids whose parents and caregivers ask questions like, "How do you think she felt when that happened?" are helping to increase this skill within their children.

Parents sometimes struggle with how to turn regular conversations into meaningful conversation. Here are some strategies to help create an empathetic conversation:

- 1. "WH" Questions Who? What? Where? Why?
- 2. Repeat and Add Repeat what your child said and add a bit more.
- 3. Follow the Leader Let your child lead the conversation. Follow with questions such as "What else happened?" Or "Tell me more about this part."
- 4. Ask for Feelings Ask about more than just events, ask about feelings.
- 5. Connect Events Help your child connect to a similar event in the past.



Student participation in school sports

Students who play sports with an instructor at school, other than in a gym class.


- 36% of students in this school had a high rate of participation in sports; the Canadian norm for these grades is 43%.

Students who skip classes or miss days at school without a reason, or arrive late for school or classes.


- In this school, the student truancy rate was 26%; the Canadian norm for these grades is 34%

Students with moderate or high levels of anxiety


Students who have intense feelings of fear, intense anxiety, or worry about particular events or social situations.








