School Expectations

There are school expectations the staff at Hilltop High School believes to be important to ensure the success of your child in our school setting. Abiding by these expectations will greatly assist in promoting a safe and caring school environment. Your cooperation is appreciated.

Respectful Communication

Definition: Appropriate communication between staff members, between students, between students and staff, and between students, staff and parents. Appropriate communication is the practice of non-heated conversations, positive body language, appropriate volume, tone and choice of language, as well as active listening. **Expectation:** Respectful communication is to be used at all times.

Lates/Attendance

Definition: Lates: coming after the usual, proper or expected time. Attendance: being in the classroom and actively learning

Expectation: Students are expected to arrive in class before the bell rings and attend class on a daily basis.

<u>Headwear</u>

Definition: Anything worn on the head that covers it.

Expectation: Headwear may not be worn on in the school between the hours of 8:30 a.m.- 3:30 p.m.

Appropriate Dress

Definition: Wearing clothing that is respectful of the learning environment.

Expectation: Students and staff will wear clothing that is non-revealing and does not have inappropriate slogans.

Cell Phones or Text Capable Electronics

Definition: Any devise capable of making a phone call or text messaging.

Expectation: Cell phones or text capable electronics are not allowed in class unless authorized by a teacher. They are off limits in all exams.

SMOKING, VAPING AND RESTRICTED AREAS

Hilltop High School is a smoke/vap-free zone. It is illegal for anyone under the age of 18 years to smoke or be in possession of nicotine. Senior High students who are of legal age must be off school property. The arena parking lot, curling rink and back alley area are out of bounds for grade 9 students from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm. All Students are not allowed to leave the school building during class or during the break between classes. Cigarettes, vaporizers and any illegal paraphernalia will be confiscated and not returned.

The Attendance Policy at Hilltop High School is as follows:



Message from Math Department

Any student enrolled in an academic math course for the 2016-2017 school year needs to complete a review package PRIOR to starting their next math course. This includes Math 10C, 20-1, 20-2, 30-1 or 30-2.

The review package is intended to review major concepts and give you the opportunity to practice your skills before advancing to the next level. If you choose not to complete the review, please understand that you will be at a disadvantage going into your next course.

If you are scheduled to take math in semester 1, then the review package needs to be completed as soon as possible. If you do not have math until semester 2, then it needs to be completed by the end of January.

Whitecourt's **ADVISORY** Committee



How to sign-up:

- 3. Click on the confirmation link in your inbox. Confirm your birthdate and Alberta Student Number. You can find your

- 4. Using a button on the subsequent screen, request that a secure verification code be mailed to your home via post. It should arrive within two weeks.
- 5. Upon receipt in the mail, login and enter the code. It will expire. Act promptly.
- 6. You will now have access to all of your academic records.

COMPETENCIES OVERVIEW



Students are the artists, scientists, thinkers, innovators and leaders of the future. They will be tasked with solving the problems of today, while imagining and creating a new tomorrow. Competencies are critical for equipping students with the knowledge, skills and attitudes that they will need to successfully navigate their personal journeys in learning, living and working.

Students use and develop competencies when they encounter unfamiliar or challenging situations. Competencies help students draw and build upon what they know, how they think and what they can do. In school, students develop and apply competencies through subject-area content and learning experiences. Alberta's curriculum promotes development of the following competencies, which are a streamlined expression of the competencies identified in the *Ministerial Order on Student Learning* (#001/2013):

CRITICAL THINKING COMMUNICATION

PROBLEM SOLVING COLLABORATION

MANAGING INFORMATION CULTURAL AND GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP

CREATIVITY AND INNOVATION PERSONAL GROWTH AND WELL-BEING

Alberta students develop competencies to achieve their full potential as lifelong learners and active citizens, today and in the future.



COMPETENCIES FAQS

FOR PARENTS

1. WHAT ARE COMPETENCIES?

Competencies are combinations of knowledge, skills and attitudes that students develop and apply for successful learning, living and working. They help students build upon how and what they know, think and can do. Students develop and apply competencies when they face new challenges and develop solutions to solve the problems of today, while imagining and creating a new tomorrow.

Alberta's curriculum promotes the development of the following competencies:

- Critical Thinking
- Problem Solving
- Managing Information
- Creativity and Innovation
- Communication
- Collaboration
- Cultural and Global Citizenship
- Personal Growth and Well-being

2. WHY ARE COMPETENCIES IMPORTANT FOR ALBERTA STUDENTS?

Through competencies, students develop and connect key aspects of knowing, thinking and doing across a variety of learning contexts, both within and outside school. When students develop competencies, they acquire knowledge, skills and attitudes that contribute to their success as lifelong learners and active citizens.

3. HOW IS STUDENT COMPETENCY DEVELOPMENT SHARED WITH PARENTS?

Teachers use a wide variety of classroom assessment tools and feedback strategies. Student performance on subject-area assessments may provide evidence of how students apply or develop competencies. Teachers may communicate development of competencies to students and parents in a variety of ways. Local school jurisdictions decide how educators will report on student progress.

4. HOW CAN PARENTS HELP THEIR CHILDREN DEVELOP COMPETENCIES?

Competencies are not just for school, they are for life. They are a useful way for parents to be involved with their child's learning. Some suggestions for how to support your child to develop competencies include:

- Ask your child's teachers how they teach competencies and what you can do at home.
- · Talk with your child about the skills and knowledge that he/she is developing and how they are useful in life.
- Do things together that use one or more competencies. This connects what your child learns at school to the things that they do in everyday life. For example: plan a meal together, learn new games, be part of a team, or discuss local or global issues.


